8. On the basis of his *Principles of Literary Criticism*, would you consider I. A. Richards a pioneer in twentieth century literary criticism ? Discuss.
9. Examine the salient aspects of Dryden's prose style in his *Essay of Dramatic poesy*.
10. Bring out the contributions of Louis Montrose and Clifford Geertz to New Historicism.
